

Station Engineer, Mr. D. Thinley, has confirmed by e-mail that he has received my snail mail reception report and will answer with a QSL. The e-mail connection to the BBS is sporadic. I sent him two e-mails replying to his e-mails to me, but in both cases they bounced back with this message: "Your message was not delivered because the destination computer was not reachable within the allowed queue period. The amount of time a message is queued before it is returned depends on local configuration parameters. Most likely there is a network problem that prevented delivery, but it is also possible that the computer is turned off, or does not have a mail system running right now. Your message was not delivered within 2 days and 0 hours. Host bbs.com.bt is not responding." (Anker Petersen, Denmark, June 7, DSWCI DX Window June 13 via DXLD)

#### **GERMANY** - IBB WILL CLOSE HISTORIC RELAY STATION IN GERMANY

The Ismaning facility, in suburban Munich, had been used in previous years to transmit VOA broadcasts on longwave, medium wave, and shortwave. Most recently it has been a satellite relay point. The IBB shortwave stations at Lampertheim and Biblis, Germany, will continue to operate. International Broadcasting Bureau announcement, 2 July 2007. Posted: 03 Jul 2007:

The Ismaning Transmitting Station in Germany is one of the oldest overseas facilities operated by the International Broadcasting Bureau. Located in a suburb of Munich, the station began beaming Voice of America programs in December 1946. Over the years, the station broadcast medium wave, long wave and shortwave programs to Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. During the Cold War, the stations in Germany were a particularly important part of our network operations. These critical transmitting stations clearly helped end the Cold War and shape the world that we live in today. In recent years, all Ismaning transmitters have been decommissioned and the station has served primarily as a satellite gateway and administrative center.

As a result of the Broadcasting Board of Governors' changing global mission to meet current U.S. government broadcast requirements, along with reduced budgets and changes in technology, the International Broadcasting Bureau will cease all operations from its Ismaning Transmitting Station during the summer of 2007. As operating budgets decrease, we have had little choice but to make difficult decisions to downsize and close some overseas facilities. Shortwave broadcasts from Germany will continue to originate from the IBB Lampertheim and Biblis transmitting facilities located south of Frankfurt.

All of us in the IBB and Broadcasting Board of Governors regret the loss of valued and skilled employees at Ismaning as a result of this action. All affected BBG employees will be treated with respect and in accordance with existing U.S. Embassy compensation agreements.

This is a very difficult time for all of us, and we are taking this action with the greatest reluctance. The employees and staff of the IBB transmitting stations in Germany have provided outstanding service to international broadcasting, and their contributions have been critically important to the United States. We have every expectation that the remaining stations in Germany will continue to provide outstanding service to the International Broadcasting Bureau. **SAINT HELENA -** Laura Lawrence, Station Manager, and Derek Richards of R. St. Helena, have just written that the final totals are: 371 QSL cards issued for the 2006 Revival broadcast on Nov 04 while four reception reports could not be verified. No fake reports were found.

During the transmission, Derek answered about 300 e-mail reports! A "clipping problem" occurred when broadcasting towards North America, so the power output had to be reduced to only 300 watts!

Regarding the test transmission on May 17, 2007, 75 e-mail reports were received. Initially, it was just to be a test for the local technicians to get the SW equipment on the air. During the test, the antenna was turned around pointing towards various continents and that explains the varying signal strength noted by many DX-ers. The audio problem was caused because an AM-signal had to be broadcast by a SSB transmitter (Robert Kipp, Langen, Germany, May 27 and Jun 01, DSWCI DX Window June 13 via DXLD

There will be some more tests (like July 17), lasting for about an hour each. (we)

Also mentioned that English language evening transmissions are to resume from B07 (David Woollan, Kathmandu, Nepal, July 13, DX LISTENING DIGEST)

**SUDAN [and non]** - 7200, SRTC; 0232-0300 4 July, 2007. First noted what is still tentatively Sudan on 1 July at 0250, and again 3 July, 0253. Between 0255 (1 July) and 0258 (3 July), Radio Bulgaria is up with 1 kHz tone, interval signal and into Bulgarian (?) at 0300. This night, 4 July, nothing here through 0229 monitoring, but recheck at 0232, already on with very indigenous vocals (not quite Somali-sounding), then Arabic male at 0235 with clear reference to "kiloHertz" and possibly "Omdurman" then a couple of words by a female, chatter atop music, vocals at 0242 (again, rather unique-sounding), female talk over reeded instrument. Because of transmitter maintenance, there is complete "radio silence" in Tibet on Tuesdays from 0600 to 1000, in both main programmes.

I met the producers of this programme at the broadcasting complex in Lhasa and was the first foreign listener to visit them. "Holy Tibet" started in May 2001 and is now a full half-hour programme. ## **VISIT TO RADIO STATION BELARUS**

by Stig Hartvig Nielsen

Stig Hartvig Nielsen travelled to Belarus via Estonia, Latvia & Lithuania in summer 2006:

#### **Belarus and Minsk**

"You must be raving mad - going to Belarus". That was a common remark prior to our departure from Vilnius, Lithuania, to Minsk - the capital of Belarus. Reading various travel guides and articles on the internet wasn't encouraging either. To put it mildly - what was being said about Belarus wasn't very positive at all. Belarus was usually described as a nasty dictatorship, Minsk was said to be a dull and boring place with lots of grey concrete buildings and with a severe lack of service. The border crossing would be a nightmare and we should expect to be watched day and night by KGB agents.

These negative descriptions didn't really hold water. The four-hour long journey from Vilnius to Minsk (costing less than £5 - including the border crossing) - went without the slightest problem. And Minsk turned out to be a modern, quite fine and very clean city. It had lots of nice parks, impressive buildings and very wide boulevards. The high-rise blocks in the suburbs were often painted in nice pastel colours. And new house building seemed to go on everywhere in the suburbs of Minsk.

We DID encounter some poor and unfriendly service in Minsk, but this was definitely the exception. On the contrary people in general were very kind and friendly. And in contrast to Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania there wasn't a swarm of beggars and hustlers to be seen in Belarus. What a relief! Not to mention tourists who were also quite rare in Minsk. We did not see any blunt KGB agents either and felt at no point intimidated.

The population of Minsk numbered 1.8 million while the total number of inhabitants of Belarus is around 10.3 million. About 80 percent of Minsk was destroyed during WW2 and so there is hardly any old, historic part of the city left - unlike the situation in Vilnius, Riga and Tallinn.

From 1922 to 1990 Belarus was a part of the Soviet Union. The country gained full independence in August 1991. Since 1994 Aleksandr Lukasjenko has been the president and he is not liked by the Western powers. The USA and EU consider the government of Belarus to be a despotic government that should be removed. Lukasjenko is accused of violating human rights, committing election fraud and for maintaining an authoritarian rule.

Under Lukasjenko, Belarus has managed the situation after the fall of socialism in 1990 quite differently to the other countries of Eastern Europe. Most of these countries are dominated by a severe unjust social situation, widespread poverty and an overall economic recession due to the neo-liberal reforms and the sale of the public sector as well as natural resources for next to nothing. Belarus didn't choose this course.

One of the first acts of Lukasjenko as president was to double wages. Lukasjenko is also well known for taking very good care of the pensioners and generally securing social welfare for the ordinary citizens of Belarus. The living standard in Belarus is the highest among the republics of the former Soviet Union. There is hardly any unemployment and attending schools and higher educations is free of charge. A remarkable 80 percent of the economy in Belarus is controlled by the state (public ownership) and so this country is considered to be one of the few countries with a so-called state controlled capitalistic economy.

#### Radio in Belarus since 1925

The first radio broadcast from Belarus was aired in November 1925. At 6.30 pm local time this announcement was heard: "This is Minsk". Listeners within 300 kilometres from Minsk were able to listen to the news in their own language - Belarusian, from the start for only 30 minutes a day.

#### Now more than 80 hours a day

Today broadcasting hours have been expanded and the Belarusian state radio is now on the air for some 80 hours a day. These hours are divided between five radio channels: 'Programme 1', 'Kanal Kultura', 'Radyjo Stalica', 'Radyous FM' and the external service 'Radio Station Belarus'. The first programme of Belarusian Radio is the old, traditional and popular channel which can be heard by 80 percent of the population. This channel is dominated by current affairs - and 90 percent of the programmes are carried out live.

#### External service since 1962

Belarusian Radio commenced broadcasting to listeners abroad in May 1962. To begin with transmissions were limited to a couple of daily broadcasts in Belarusian only. These programmes were aimed at Belarusian seamen in the Mediterranean.

According to the WRTH, English language broadcasts were carried during the mid-eighties twice a month and in 1985 German language transmissions were launched from what was then known as Radio Minsk. To begin with, these were only once a week but within a couple of years German was aired three times a week.

English language programmes from Minsk were re-introduced in 1994. They were aired once a week. At the same time weekly transmissions in Polish were also introduced. However, these programmes in English and Polish ceased after a couple of years and so Minsk was again broadcasting in Belarusian and German only. It wasn't until 2000 when a foreign service in English and Russian - besides German and Belarusian - as we know it today - was introduced.

#### No - we're not sending propaganda

It's not difficult finding the building of Belarusian Radio in Minsk. A meeting had been arranged beforehand and after filling out some sort of security pass we were taken to the 3rd floor in the grand, old radio building, where the foreign service have their offices. We were heartily welcomed by four of the staff of the English service and we were treated with local specialities and presents. The four were Rusland Prokhorov, who is also the vice director of the entire Belarusian Radio, mailbag editor Larisa Suáres, chief secretary Julia Nikitenko and announcer Julia Radkova. Radio Station Belarus is meant to counterbalance the Western media, where almost everything being said about Belarus is untrue according to the employees of the radio station. But they don't consider themselves a propaganda station like for instance Radio Free Europe-Radio Liberty (RFE-RL). Immediately stressing that RFE in particular is the source of some of the most stupid and ridiculous lies about Belarus.

Radio Station Belarus do not however try and refute any of the stories told by Western media such as RFE. "No - we've been through a major development here with our programmes. We are more sincere and frank than in the past. We don't do propaganda - we're more trying to do popular diplomacy". Some two thirds of the programmes are filled with analysis concerning economics, policy, the social situation, culture, history, education etc. while some 15 to 20 percent consists of cultural stuff and another 15 to 20 percent consists of music and entertainment. Among the regular popular programmes 'Letters to the Editor' can be found. It is aired each and every Saturday.

#### **Co-operation with the Voice of Russia**

Belarus has close links with Russia and Radio Station Belarus also has close relations with the Russian external service, Voice of Russia. "We are not as big as the Voice of Russia", says the English language speaking employees of Radio Station Belarus, "but the quality is just as good".

#### Most letters are coming from Sweden

Radio Station Belarus has an extremely active listenership in Sweden who write letters to the station several times a week. Therefore Sweden tops the chart of countries from where most mail is being received. Following Sweden countries like the UK, USA and Finland are found.

Radio Station Belarus receives some 1,600 letters a year from around 36 different countries. During the summer period the response is a lot lower than during the rest of the year. Keeping in touch with the listeners is considered very important at Radio Station Belarus, and they do their best to handle the letters from the listeners with as much care as possible.

#### Two hours in English each night

Radio Station Belarus can be heard in English 22 hours a day via internet streaming and it's possible to listen to the most recent broadcast in English via audio-on-demand from <a href="http://www.radiobelarus.tvr.by/eng">http://www.radiobelarus.tvr.by/eng</a>>.

Besides that, Radio Station Belarus can be heard in English on shortwave for two hours each and every night at 20 to 22 hours UT on 7105, 7390 and 7440 kHz (new A07 schedule). The English programmes are also carried locally on 1170 kHz mediumwave at the same time. English on 1170 has been heard here in Denmark, but with poor reception.

#### MALAYSIA RADIO BROADCASTING IN MALAYSIAN BORNEO - SABAH by Adrian Peterson

This article features all known information about the Japanese & Australian & Malaysian radio stations on Labuan Island and Malaysian North Borneo - Sabah during the formative years. On several occasions I have visited Kota Kinabalu in North Borneo and during my most recent visit I found an old radio receiver, a prewar model made in England. This radio had a glass dial upon which were printed the local radio stations, SW & MW, that were on the air in that part of Asia at the time.

Located at the northern tip on the island of Borneo is the territory known as Sabah. This geographic entity is a state of Malaysia and it occupies an area of 29,000 square miles with a population something over one million people. The capital city, known in earlier years as Jesselton, was renamed Kota Kinabalu in 1968.

Back one thousand years ago, tribal groups were already settled in many areas of Borneo, and European explorers began to visit the area in the 1500s. In the mid 1800s, the British took over the coastal areas of north Borneo, and on January 1. 1942, Japanese forces landed on Labuan island off the coast of Sabah. For a period of more than four years, the island was known as Pulau Maida, in honor of the local Japanese commander. Australian forces landed on Pulau Maida on June 5, 1945, and soon took over the mainland areas of Sabah also. Sabah became the eastern-most state of Malaysia on September 16, 1983.

The story of radio broadcasting in Sabah goes back to the early days of wireless transmission, in the 1920s and 1930s, when two stations were installed, VCK on Labuan Island and VQA at Jesselton. Interestingly, more events in radio history occurred on the small and beautiful, touristy island of Labuan than in the larger territory of Sabah itself. So, let's take a look at these historic events as they transpired on Labuan Island.

Remarkable as it may seem, a total of six radio broadcasting stations were on the air on the island of Labuan in the short span of just two years. Mobile forces of the Australian army landed on Labuan on June 5, 1945 and just six days later, an army photographer took a series of black & white photographs of what was described as a broadcasting station. Obviously, because of the short time span, this had to be an installation that was abandoned by the Japanese. This is indeed a tantalizing news item. There are no known DX reports anywhere in the world that indicate that the Japanese were on the air from a broadcasting station located in North Borneo. We could ask the question: Was this station then a program broadcasting station, or in reality a station used for the broadcast of communication information to Japanese personnel throughout the area?

Now, just two or three weeks later, an Australian soldier in North Borneo reported to a radio magazine in Melbourne Victoria that he heard on local mediumwave a relay broadcast from the American shortwave station KROJ in California. A correlation of the specific dates assures us that this mediumwave relay of an American shortwave program took place more than three months before the arrival of mobile radio stations from Australia. Could we speculate then that radio personnel in the Australian army on Labuan began to experiment with the Japanese radio station and made a few test broadcasts on mediumwave using a shortwave receiver as a program source?

To add to this intriguing story, we find next, that a month or two later, an Australian soldier stationed in North Borneo visited a broadcasting station that was identified on air as JL2, apparently located on Labuan Island. He stated that the equipment was totally Japanese and that it was a neat operation. Maybe station JL2 was a subsequent usage of the same facility that was photographed by the Australian photographer.

The output power at station JL2 was 50 watts, and the antenna is described as a 100 ft wire, which fits the antenna system as shown in the black & white photograph. This station was heard in North Borneo, the Philippines and New Guinea on a shortwave channel given as 42 metres.

The broadcasting service from station JL2 was followed by Radio Labuan, a 500 watt shortwave station operating from a three ton army truck. This new Radio Labuan began service on October 1, 1945 and it was on the air for a period of six weeks. It is suggested that this was an army communication facility that was taken over for a program broadcasting service. The shortwave transmitter was an American-made Hallicrafters model BC610 fed into a half wave center-fed Zeppelin tuned to a 7 MHz channel.

Shortwave Radio Labuan was followed briefly by an AAAS station, unidentified at the time, but operating on 980 kHz. It is presumed that this was the 10 watt Australian mobile station 9AP which was known to be in the area at the time.

Next came another mobile AAAS station, 9AF, which was transported from Sydney Harbour on the American navy vessel, USS "Henry Ricea", and delivered to Tarakan in Borneo and then apparently driven overland and ultimately delivered to Labuan Island in October. However, simultaneously, a specific radio building was

under construction on Labuan Island and the electronic equipment from the three 3 ton trucks was installed into the more spacious building. This rather substantial radio station was inaugurated on November 8, 1945, and it was on the air for approximately five months.

Around November 1946, the noted Arne Skoog in Sweden heard a station that he identified as Radio Labuan on the unusual channel 2995 kHz. Nothing more is known about this station, and it could have been the first [sic] harmonic >from a mediumwave unit on 1497.5 kHz, or a fundamental emission from an army communication station in the 100 metre band.

That's the end of the story about radio broadcasting on Labuan Island, Sabah, North Borneo, until the more recent era when Radio Malaysia established local relay stations on this notable tourist island. So, let's go across the waterways to the mainland area of Jesselton or Kota Kinabalu itself, the modern and progressive state capital of the Malaysian state of Sabah. As mentioned earlier, there was a spark wireless station, VQA, on the air for Morse Code communication with Singapore back in the 1920s and 1930s.

Then, in January 1946, there was a 10 watt mobile station on the air in Jesselton on 980 kHz. This station, with the callsign 9AO, was then transferred to the Indonesian island of Morotai a few weeks later, on March 4. It was then intended that another 10 watt mobile station, 9AP, would be transferred for service in the Jesselton area. However, that plan was deleted due to the fact that Australian servicemen had transferred out to other areas.

Next comes the story of regular radio broadcasting in Jesselton which began in 1952 with an experimental program service from the 250 watt shortwave communication station VS4S. Temporary studios were installed on Bruce Hill, the antenna was a folded dipole a quarter wavelength above ground, and programming consisted mainly of news and announcements.

It was announced in 1952 that a new shortwave station was under installation near Jesselton and it was officially inaugurated in November 1955 with 5 kW under the regular callsign VQA.

Some eleven years later, a new studio building was erected for Radio Sabah on Tuaran Road. This was at about the same time as the Federation of Malaysia was formed and the British colony of Sabah became the eastern-most state of Malaysia. The name of the state capital, Jesselton, was changed to Kota Kinabalu, in honor of the high mountain nearby, five years after federation.

This original shortwave transmitter at Jesselton - Kota Kinabalu was rated at 5 kW and it was in general broadcast usage for a period of nearly twenty years on two major channels, 4970 kHz and 5980 kHz.

However, in 1969, a new radio base was established at Laya Laya, near Kota Kinabalu, and two new 10 kW shortwave transmitters were installed. This new facility was officially inaugurated on May 1, 1971.

These two NEC shortwave transmitters from Japan were in constant usage for many years, and apparently one gave out half a dozen years ago, and the other just more recently. The last known logging of Radio Malaysia Sabah on shortwave occurred on September 27, 2003 when an Australian monitor, Craig Seager, heard the station and made the observation that this station "was not often heard".

However, in spite of the fact that this lonely shortwave station does seem to be off the air these days, yet the two shortwave channels, 4970 kHz & 5980 kHz, have been registered for use by Radio Malaysia in Kota Kinabalu in more recent time. It is probable that their nationwide mediumwave and FM networks, together with the high powered 700 kW mediumwave transmitter on 1475 kHz, now give adequate radio coverage throughout Sabah.

Back during the era when Sabah was active on shortwave, QSL cards were issued, both by the original Radio Sabah, and subsequently by Radio Malaysia Sabah.
